Township of Chapleau Council passed a resolution #20-245 on September 26, 2022 to authorize the CAO provide feedback to Northeastern Ontario Electricity requesting the new corridor recommended from Timmins to Wawa be situated near the Township of Chapleau.
What other information should be considered in finalizing the recommended solutions and final report?
